

**Safety & Security Information Report** The following policies are provided as part of the University of Maine at Farmington's commitment to safety and security on campus, and are in compliance with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act, enacted in October 1998. The University of Maine at Farmington is a public University located in the town of Farmington, Maine. UMF is one of seven campuses that comprise the University of Maine System. There are approximately 2,000 students enrolled at UMF, and approximately 350 employees. UMF is one of a small percentage of institutions that for more than a decade voluntarily submitted data to the State and National Uniform Crime Reporting System. The University has been firmly committed to honest and timely reporting of all crime statistics and will continue with that commitment under the Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act of 1990. All data and statistics used for this document are gathered from the UMF Dept. of Public Safety records, which contain reports of all incidents and crimes reported by victims of crimes, the UMF Conduct Officer, Farmington PD, UMF employees and anonymous sources. **Policy Statement Addressing the Reporting of Criminal Offenses:**  
To report a crime: Contact Department of Public Safety at 778-7400, dial 911 (for emergencies only), or by using any of the emergency call boxes throughout campus. Any suspicious activity or person seen in the parking lots or loitering around vehicles, inside buildings or around the Residence halls should be reported to the Public Safety Department. Each department augments with the other within their jurisdictions during mutual investigations, arrest, and prosecutions. UMF Police personnel attend monthly meetings with local law enforcement agencies to exchange ideas and problems which may be of concern for the University community.

**Reporting of Criminal Activities or Emergencies:** Community members, students, faculty, staff, and guests are encouraged to report all crimes and public safety related incidents to the Department of Public Safety in a timely manner. This publication focuses on the Department of Public Safety because it patrols the majority of the widely spread UMF campus. **To report a crime, emergency, non emergency, security or public safety related matter on campus call the Department of Public Safety at 778-7400.** To report a crime off-campus call the Farmington Police Department at 778-6311 or the Franklin County Sheriffs Office at 778-2680. Dispatchers are available at these respective telephone numbers 24 hours a day to answer your call. In response to a call, UMF Department of Public Safety will take the required action, dispatching an officer or asking the victim to report to their office to file an incident report. All Department of Public Safety incident reports involving resident students are forwarded to the Director of Student Life for review and to the Vice President of Student & Community Services for any involved students living off-campus. If assistance is required from the Farmington Police Department or Farmington Fire Department the Department of Public Safety will contact the appropriate unit. If a sexual assault or rape should occur, staff on the scene, including Public Safety, will offer the victim a wide variety of services. SAVES (Sexual Assault Victims Emergency Services) Crisis Center has trained staff which is available to assist a victim on their 24-hour hotline at 1-800-871-7741. This publication contains information about on-campus and off-campus resources. That information is made available to provide the UMF community members with specific information about the resources that are available in the event that they become the victim of a crime. The information about "resources" is not provided to infer that those resources are "reporting entities" for UMF. Crimes should be reported to the Department of Public Safety to ensure inclusion in the annual crime statistics and to aid in providing timely warning notices to the community, when appropriate. For example, a crime that was reported only to the SAVES Crisis Center would not be included in the UMF crime statistics.

**Confidential Reporting Procedures:** If you are the victim of a crime and do not want to pursue action within the University System or the criminal justice system, you may still want to consider making a confidential report. With your permission, the Director of Public Safety can file a report on the details of the incident without revealing your identity. The purpose of a confidential report is to help take steps to ensure the future safety of you and others. With such information, the University can keep an accurate records of the number of incidents involving students, determine where there is a pattern of crime with regard to a particular location, method, or assailant, and alert the campus community to potential danger. Reports filed in this manner are counted and disclosed in the annual crimes statistics for the institution.

#### **Procedures Victims Should Follow Should an Offense**

**Occur:** Any victims of any incidents, including assaults, sex offenses or sex assaults should immediately contact the UMF Dept. of Public Safety, which will immediately respond to assist the victims in getting medical attention, then investigate the crime. **At all times, the victim's rights will be protected and the victim will have input into the course of the investigation.** Counseling services will be provided if the victim is receptive to such services. **Notification of Options for Changing Living Areas or Academic Situations:** Any victims of any incidents, including assaults, sex offenses or sexual assaults have the right to request a change in living areas or academic situations. If an immediate threat is perceived by a person, they can be reassigned a different room or building basis until the threat is removed or eliminated. **Disciplinary Sanctions for Any Sex Offense or Sexual Assault:** Any person found to have committed any sex offense or sexual assault by the University of Maine at Farmington Conduct Committee and/or the Maine Criminal Justice System will be subject to severe disciplinary sanctions to include immediate suspension or dismissal.

**Access to Campus Facilities:** Most University of Maine at Farmington buildings and facilities are accessible to the campus community, guests, and visitors during normal business hours 8am - 4:30pm, Monday through Friday.

**Access to Campus Residence Halls:** Access is granted to residents via an electronic card access control system. Guests may gain access by calling a resident living in the hall and being escorted in by that individual. *Exterior doors to residence halls are locked 24 hours a day.* Emergencies may necessitate changes or alterations to any posted schedules. Areas that are revealed as problematic have security surveys conducted of them. Administrators from the Vice President's Office, Facilities Management, Residence Life, and other concerned areas review these results. These surveys examine security issues such as landscaping, locks, alarms, lighting, and communications. Additionally, during the academic year, the Directors of Facilities Management, Housing, Residence Life, Public Safety, and Maintenance meet often to discuss issues of pressing concern.

**Maintenance and Security of Campus Facilities:** UMF maintains a very strong commitment to maintaining a safe level of exterior lighting. Campus Police Officers and Security Guards routinely survey existing lights and recommend maintenance of existing lights and additional illumination, as required. Members of the campus community are encouraged to report any exterior lighting deficiencies to the Dept. of Public Safety at any time by calling 778-7400. Exterior doors of non-residence halls on campus are locked and secured each evening. Campus Police Officers and Security Guards check all buildings throughout the night. Campus Police Officers and Security Guards also survey and report any possible security problems with doors. This is given a high priority, and if the problem represents a hazard, a maintenance person will be called in immediately to make the necessary repairs and adjustments.

**Maine Sex Offender Registry:** In accordance to the "Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act" of 2000, the UMF Department of Public Safety is providing a link to the Maine Sex Offender Registry. This act requires institutions of higher education to issue a statement advising the campus community where law enforcement information provided by a State concerning registered sex offenders may be obtained. It also requires sex offenders already required to register in a State to provide notice of each institution of higher education in the State at which the person is employed, carries a vocation, or is a student. In Maine, convicted sex offenders must register with the Maine Sex Offender Registry maintained by the Department of State Police. At UMF DPS, we provide information about any registered sex offenders in our area. The State of Maine Bureau of Identification is the base for the Maine Sex Offender Registry program. Our local law enforcement agencies, the Farmington Police Department and the Franklin County Sheriff's Office also provide information regarding registered sex offenders. **Security & Crime Prevention Programs:** During orientation in September students are informed of services offered by the Department of Public Safety. Students are told about crime on-campus and in surrounding neighborhoods. Similar information is presented to new employees. Crime Prevention Programs and Sexual Assault Prevention Programs are offered on a continual basis. Periodically during the academic year the Department of Public Safety, in cooperation with other university organizations and departments, present crime prevention awareness sessions on sexual assault (rape and acquaintance rape), Rohypnol abuse, theft, and vandalism, as well as educational sessions on personal safety and residence hall security. A common theme of all awareness and crime prevention programs is to encourage students and employees to be aware of their responsibility for their own security and the security of others. In addition to seminars, information is disseminated to students and employees through crime prevention awareness packets, security alert posters, bulletin boards, and articles and advertisements in university and student newspapers. When time is of the essence, information is released to the university community through security alerts posted prominently throughout campus, through computer memos sent over the university's electronic mail system and voice mail broadcasting system and text message service The following is a listing of the crime prevention programs and projects in use at UMF:

**Residence Hall Security Awareness:** Crime prevention, safety, and security programs are presented in each residence hall at the beginning of the Fall semester. A week prior to the beginning of each Fall semester the UMF Dept. of Public Safety conducts a mandatory safety and security briefing with the residential life staff.

**Emergency Telephones:** There are free extension phones on every floor in each residence hall, which can be used to contact the UMF Dept. of Public Safety or other emergency services. Outdoor emergency call-boxes linked to the Dept. of Public Safety communication system are also available.

**Escort Service:** Inter-Campus Escort Service (I.C.E.), under the direct supervision of the UMF Dept. of Public Safety, provides evening escort service to students and employees. To use the Escort Service during the evening hours (4pm-12am) call the Dept. of Public Safety 778-7400, or call Inter-Campus Escort, 778-7400.

**Printed Crime Prevention Materials:** The UMF Dept. of Public Safety prints and distributes numerous brochures and handouts relating to rape prevention, crime prevention, residence hall safety tips, and emergency reporting procedures. These handouts are also posted on residence hall bulletin boards.

**Operation Identification:** Operation Identification, the engraving of serial numbers or owner-recognized numbers on items of value, is strongly promoted in student residence facilities and is available to students and employees upon request. The serial numbers of valuables are recorded and a record maintained at the Dept. of Public Safety.

**Operation T.I.P.P. (dial 8477)** A confidential information hotline. Confidential information can be left on voice mail. Caller does not need to leave his or her name. DIAL: 778-8477.

**Crime Prevention Publicity:** Crime prevention material is routinely published in the student newspaper, *The UMF Farmington Flyer*; shown over TV monitors in the Olsen Student Center; and broadcast on the student radio station, WUMF 100.1 FM.

**Timely Warnings:** In the event that a situation arises, either on or off campus, that, in the judgment of the Director of Public Safety, constitutes an ongoing or continuing threat, a campus wide "timely warning" will be issued. The warning will be issued through the college e-mail system to students, faculty, staff and the campus' student newspaper, *The UMF Farmington Flyer*. Depending on the particular circumstances of the crime, especially in all situations that could pose an immediate threat to the community and individuals, the Office of Public Safety may also post a notice on the campus-wide bulletin boards and on the Departments web site at: <http://publicsafety.umf.maine.edu/>, providing the university community with more immediate notification. In such instances, a copy of the notice is posted in each residence hall, and in the Olsen Student Center. Anyone with information warranting a timely warning should report the circumstances to the Department of Public Safety office, by phone 778-7400 or in person at the Public Safety Office, 248 Main Street, the building between Admissions and Franklin Hall.

**Sex Offense or Sexual Assault Awareness, Education, and Prevention:** The UMF President's Committee on Rape Prevention plays a large role in the education of the University community. Members speak to all faculty and departmental meetings, they develop and distribute the UMF Sex Offense and Sexual Assault Policy and Procedure booklet, and oversee the Peer Rape Prevention Educators (PRPE's). The PRPE's raise awareness through presentations done in the residence halls (also done by the UMF Dept. of Public Safety), movies, posters, and handouts. The committee members and the PRPE's have spoken in class sessions of PHE 100, Fitness and Health, and are available to speak in any class upon request. Participation by the members of the committee in new student orientation sessions, mailings to new students, and in the September Organizational Fair allows for distribution of written materials as well as a presentation of a skit dealing with rape. Kiosks, (free-standing bulletin boards) and short statements on an overhead projector are monthly occurrences in the Olsen Student Center. \*For individual assistance in the area of sex offense or sexual assault prevention, students may consult any of the three sex offense or sexual assault victim advocates: the counselors in the Center for Human Development, the staff in the Student Health Center, or members of the UMF Dept. of Public Safety. Students believed to be violation of University of Maine at Farmington and/or the Student Life Department policies meet with an Assistant Director, Director of Student Life, and/or the Vice President for Student and Community Services, the university's conduct code officer. Students found responsible for violating policy can be sanctioned with the following: warning, probation, termination of housing contract, and/or suspension. Other education sanction can also be imposed. For example, community service and referral for alcohol/drug evaluations (BASICS) are often used.

**Law Enforcement Authority and Interagency Relationships:** The UMF Dept. of Public Safety is currently comprised of four full-time and nine part-time Police Officers. Each officer is certified by the Maine Criminal Justice Academy as a Law Enforcement Officer, which means that all officers have fulfilled the statutory requirements pursuant to Title 25 of the Maine Revised Statutes Annotated Section 2805. This certification is kept current by department participation in 40 hours of Academy sanctioned in-service training per year. Police Officers at UMF have full law enforcement authorization on all property owned or controlled by the University of Maine at Farmington. The Police Officers of the UMF Dept. of Public Safety receive the enforcement authority via the provisions of Public Law 1971, Chapter 544, Section 142, as amended, and the Board of Trustees grants each campus President, or his or her appointed representative, the authority to appoint persons to act as Police Officers at that campus. While the UMF Dept. of Public Safety is completely autonomous and separate from state, county, and municipal police forces, it maintains a cooperative relationship with them. Through interagency agreements between local law enforcement agencies and the UMF Dept. of Public Safety, all reports of criminal activity associated with student organizations off campus are shared or reported to the UMF Dept. of Public Safety. These reports are subsequently shared with the appropriate University administrators and departments. Officers have direct radio communication with the Farmington Police Department, and the Franklin County Sheriff's Office to facilitate rapid response to any emergency situation. **Policy Statement Addressing Criminal Activity Off Campus:** When a UMF student is involved in an off-campus offense, officers may assist with the investigation in cooperation with local, state, or federal law enforcement. Farmington Police Department routinely work and communicate with campus officers on all incidents occurring on-campus or in the immediate neighborhood and business' surrounding campus. UMF operates no off-campus housing or off-campus student organization facilities. However, many students live in the neighborhoods surrounding UMF. While the Farmington Police Department has primary jurisdiction in all areas off campus, UMF officers can and do respond to student-related incidents that occur in close proximity to campus. UMF officers have direct radio communications with the local police, fire department, and ambulance services to facilitate rapid response in any emergency situation.

### Policy For Reporting The Annual Disclosure of Crime Statistics

The Department of Public Safety prepares this report to comply with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Crime Statistics Act. The full text of this report can be located on our web site at <http://publicsafety.umf.maine.edu>. You will also be able to connect to our site via the UMF home page at [www.farmington.edu](http://www.farmington.edu). This report is prepared in cooperation with the local law enforcement agencies surrounding our main campus and alternate sites, Housing and Residential Services, the Vice President for Student & Community Services. Each entity provides updated information on their educational efforts and programs to comply with the Act. Campus crime, arrest and referral statistics include those reported to the Department of Public Safety, designated campus officials (including but not limited to directors, deans, department heads, designated VP of Student Services, advisors of students/student organizations, athletic coaches), and local law enforcement agencies. These statistics may also include crimes that have occurred in private residences or businesses and is not required by law. Staff at the Center for Human Development informs their clients of the procedures to report crime to the Department of Public Safety on a voluntary or confidential basis, should they feel it is in the best interest of the client. A procedure is in place to anonymously capture crime statistics disclosed confidentially during such a session. Each year, an e-mail notification is made to all enrolled students that provides the web site to access this report. Faculty and staff receive similar email notification. Copies of the report may also be obtained at the Department of Public Safety, located at 248 Main Street (between Admissions and Franklin Hall) or by calling (207) 778-7400. All prospective employees may obtain a copy from Human Resources, second floor of Merrill Hall or by calling (207) 778-7246, and the web site address will be attached to the UMF employment applications. A partial version of this report is located in the class schedule.

### Procedures for Campus Disciplinary Action:

1. The accuser and accused will have the same rights to have others present at any hearing, including the assistance of an advisor and/or legal counsel.
2. The accuser and accused will both be informed of the outcome of any such hearings when the charge is a violent act. Victims must be informed of their option to notify proper law enforcement authorities, and their option to be assisted in doing so. If a sex offense or sexual assault is reported to any University official other than the University of Maine at Farmington, Dept. of Public Safety, the victim will be informed of their option to notify proper law enforcement authorities (including the UMF Dept. of Public Safety) and will be assisted in doing so if requested. Note: The evidence of any sex offense or sexual assault is critical in the investigation and must be secured as soon as possible. Related information can be found at:

**Policy Statement Addressing Counselors:** As a result of the negotiated rule-making process which followed the signing into law, the 1998 amendments to 20 U.S.C. Section 1092 (f), clarification was given to those considered to be campus security authorities. Campus "Professional Counselors", when acting as such, are not considered to be a campus security authority and are not required to report crimes for inclusion into the annual disclosure of crime statistics. As a matter of policy, they are encouraged; if and when they deem it appropriate, to inform persons being counseled of the procedures to report crimes on a voluntary basis for inclusion into the annual crime statistics.

**Professional Counselor:** An employee of an institution whose official responsibilities include providing psychological counseling to members of the institution's community within the scope of his or her license or certification.

**Alcohol and Substance Abuse Policies:** The University of Maine at Farmington, Department of Public Safety is committed to providing a safe and orderly environment for all members of the campus community. To accomplish this goal, the University advises all members that it is unlawful to manufacture, distribute, dispense, possess and/or use illegal drugs on UMF property. Any violation of this policy or state and federal laws regarding drugs may result in prosecution or campus disciplinary action. The University of Maine at Farmington views alcohol and substance abuse as a serious problem. In compliance with the Drug Free Schools and Communities and the Drug Free Workplace Act, the University publishes and distributes annually a booklet which informs all students and employees of UMF's substance abuse policy, sanctions for violation of the policy, and state and federal alcohol and drug laws, offenses and sanctions. **Alcohol Awareness and Education:** The Student Life Department engages in numerous alcohol education and awareness activities. Information is conveyed to students through residence hall newsletters, hall and floor meetings, and bulletin boards. The University of Maine at Farmington participated in a statewide alcohol grant to examine alcohol use. An alcohol committee was formed, including an Assistant Director from Student Life. Surveys were conducted as part of the CORE Institute to look at drinking on campus. This data was compared to other Maine institutions and other institutions similar to the University of Maine at Farmington. Social norm posters were displayed with the results. The e-CHUG link, a self-assessment test, was also added the Center for Human Development webpage. The Student Life Department offered and/or sponsored numerous alcohol awareness programs. Resident Assistants in every hall offered programs such as "Have a Drink on Us", a non-alcoholic alternative to drinking, and a "Beer Goggles" program looking at the effect of alcohol and possible legal ramifications with drinking and driving. Alcohol educational bulletin boards are displayed the first-week of school in all the halls to provide policy and education information.
